## Spiritual Resources for Lent Week V

*Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> March – Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> March 2021*



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## Introduction

In this fifth week of Lent the focus turns inexorably towards the forthcoming death and resurrection of Our Lord. Following his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his suffering, death, and Resurrection and prepared his disciples to believe in the salvation that his death would accomplish.

Using the metaphor of the grain of wheat, Jesus introduced the idea that out of his death, new life would emerge – not only for his own body but for all creation. He also taught that those who called themselves his disciples must follow his example of sacrifice. This theme was to be repeated in John's account of the Last Supper, when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples as an example of how they must serve one another.

In this most solemn of seasons, let us remember that the journey to the Cross is not one we make alone. We walk with one another, and we walk with Our Lord through the darkness, in sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life.




## Reflection and Prayer for the Day


## Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> March

### *Feria of Passiontide*

For most of my life I have struggled to find God, to know God, to love God. I have tried hard to follow the guidelines of the spiritual life - pray always, work for others, read the Scriptures - and to avoid the many temptations to dissipate myself. I have failed many times but always tried again, even when I was close to despair.

Now I wonder whether I have sufficiently realized that during all this time God has been trying to find me, to know me, and to love me. The question is not 'How am I to find God?' but 'How am I to let myself be found by him?' The question is not 'How am I to know God?' but 'How am I to let myself be known by God?' And, finally, the question is not 'How am I to love God?' but 'How am I to let myself be loved by God?' God is looking into the distance for me, trying to find me, and longing to bring me home.

## Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March

*Feria of Passiontide*

Whether we really have found God's peace will be shown by how we deal with the sufferings that will come upon us. There are many Christians who do, indeed, kneel before the cross of Jesus Christ, and yet reject and struggle against every tribulation in their own lives.


They believe they love the cross of Christ, and yet they hate that cross in their own lives. And so in truth they hate the cross of Jesus Christ as well, and in truth despise that cross and try by any means possible to escape it...

They have basically merely sought peace with the world, believing possibly that by means of the cross of Jesus Christ they might best come to terms with themselves and with all their questions, and thus find inner peace of the soul.

They have used the cross, but not loved it. They have sought peace for their own sake. But when tribulation comes, that peace quickly flees them. It was not peace with God, for they hated the tribulation God sends...

But those who love the cross of Jesus Christ, those who have genuinely found peace in it, now begin to love even the tribulations in their lives, and ultimately will be able to say with scripture, 'We also boast in our sufferings.'

## Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> March


*Oscar Romero*

Thursday 25th March  
*Annunciation of Our Lord*

Universal Mother

When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman, here is your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother' (St John 19. 26-27).


This encounter between Jesus and his mother is heart-breaking and tender. But one of the more unsettling aspects of John's presentation of the mother of Jesus is that the evangelist never uses her name. When she asks Jesus to intervene at the wedding feast of Cana, Jesus responds: 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come' (St John 2. 4). Now, from the cross, Jesus again calls her 'Woman.'

I can only imagine what my mother would have done had I addressed her as 'Woman'! Sulpician Father Raymond Brown, a noted biblical scholar, proposes that this was Jesus' polite term for addressing women, as evident elsewhere in the gospels.

Whatever Jesus' intent, we are struck at the distance the word creates. He does not use a term of endearment or of personal relationship. Rather, he identifies Mary by her biology: woman. In doing so, Jesus opens up the possibility for all women (and I would argue men as well) to find their place in this encounter. Those who stand on the verge of absolute grief, seemingly unredeemable suffering, and face an uncertain and frightening future are themselves standing as 'woman' or 'man' at the foot of the cross.

'Woman, here is your son' (St John 19. 26). Here, Jesus is not being self-referential. He is giving his mother a new son. Here, he is also giving a new mother to this disciple whom he loves. New relationships are being born from the experience of grief. Mary does not cease to be a mother at the death of her son. But she must now learn to be mother and woman in a new way.


## Friday 26<sup>th</sup> March

*Harriet Monsell (1811 – 1883) founded the Community of St John Baptist, an order of Augustinian nuns in the Church of England dedicated to social service, which by her death had expanded to numerous houses, including in India and the Americas. She was the first nun to take vows in the Church of England since the Reformation.*

Human compassion, that most lovely of qualities, is the ability so to put yourself in someone else's place that you know a little what it must be like to go through their experience of suffering- and so love is drawn out of you ... Now what Passiontide does - what Good Friday does- is to invite us to open ourselves to the compassion of God. Not his anger, but his compassion: a God who from the cross begs us to be forgiven and to know ourselves accepted, valued and loved ... Ultimately, God will be seen to be what in Jesus he is declared to be: the one who by suffering alongside us reveals his passion and his compassion, and will at the end wipe away all tears from our eyes.

that we are pardoned, and in dying that we are born to eternal life.



## Spiritual Communion

During this second national lockdown all public acts of worship have been suspended. This means that many people who would have received Holy Communion each Sunday, and some of them every day, are not able to receive the comfort and benefits of the sacrament.

This is a huge loss. However, it is not the first time that the Church has been in such a position. Throughout Christian history some Christian people have found themselves isolated from the sacramental life of the Church for all sorts of reasons, and particularly in times of plague, famine and warfare.

At such times the Church has encouraged people to make what is called a Spiritual Communion. It is a way of uniting yourself with Jesus and entering into communion with him even though you are not able to receive the sacrament itself.

The prayer that follows draws on the story of the woman who comes to Jesus but only touches the hem of his garment. She still receives healing and blessing (See St Mark 5. 25-34). In a way, spiritual communion is like this. We are not able to receive the sacramental bread and wine. But in a spiritual communion we still come to Jesus and he still receives us.

### *Act of Spiritual Reception*

O loving God, in union with Christian people throughout the world and across the centuries gathered to make Eucharist, hearing your holy Word and receiving the Precious Body and Blood of your dear Son, I offer you praise and thanksgiving.

Even though I am exiled from tasting the Bread of Heaven and drinking the Cup of Life I pray that you will unite me with all the baptised and with your Son who gave his life for us.

Come Lord Jesus, dwell in me and send your Holy Spirit that I may be filled with your presence.

## The Angelus
